


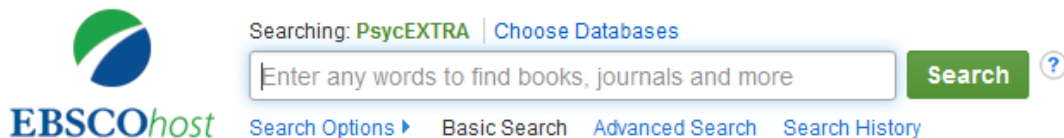


## Quick Start Guide- PsycEXTRA

Produced by the American Psychological Association (APA), PsycEXTRA is a bibliographic and full-text companion to the scholarly PsycINFO database. The document types included are technical, annual and government reports, conference papers, newsletters, magazines, newspapers, consumer brochures and more.

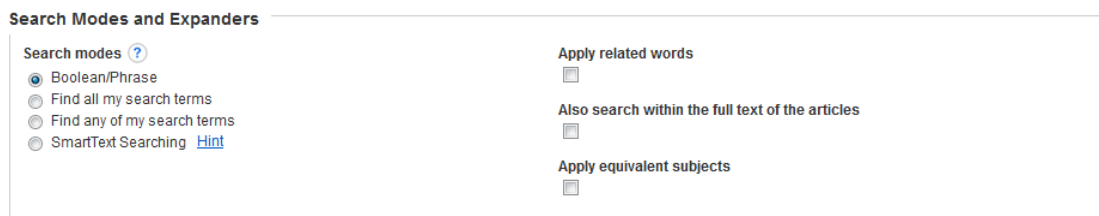
This guide is intended to help you start searching the database and to save, print or email articles you find. You can get further help by clicking on this icon  while you are in the database.

## Searching




There are Basic and Advanced Search options. Take a few moments to have a look at these different screens, and see which works best for you and the research you are doing.

## The Basic Search Screen



### Search Modes

Within the Basic search screen you can conduct your search in different ways using the search modes. Click the  icon within the database for further help.

**Boolean/Phrase** – If this is selected you can use AND, OR and NOT in the search box to refine your search. It also allows you to use quotation marks for an exact phrase.

**Find all of my search terms** – adds AND to all search terms entered (e.g. web AND accessibility).

**Find any of my search terms** – adds OR to all search terms entered (e.g. web OR accessibility).

**SmartText Searching** - You can copy and paste chunks of text (up to 5000 characters including spaces) to search for results.

**Apply related words** - includes synonyms (words with the same or a similar meaning) and plurals of search terms.



**Also search within the full text of articles** - select this to look for your terms in the whole article not just the abstract and citation.

**Apply equivalent subjects** – when your search term matches a known concept, the search is expanded to include that concept. For example if you search ‘workplace injury’, the search will also include results for ‘work-related injuries’ and ‘occupational injuries’.

You can narrow down your search by placing limits on it.

- **Linked Full Text** – select if you want to search the texts of articles in other EBSCO databases
- **Publication Name** - if you want to limit your results to a specific journal, put the name of the journal
- **English** – select if you only want materials in English
- **Published Date** – use if you want to search a specific time range

Select from the drop down menus and hold down the ‘Ctrl’ key to select more than one. Use these to tailor your search to fit the topic you are studying, for example you can search for studies or articles about a particular age group and using a certain methodology.

Advanced Search allows you to narrow or expand your search results more easily by using AND, OR or NOT. You can also select a field, such as title, author or keywords. Click the + symbol to add more rows.

As with the Basic Search you can use the ‘Search Modes’ and the ‘Limit Your Results’ feature.



## Viewing, printing and saving

From the results list click the title of the article you want to print. The article below is available in 2 different formats. Click on **HTML Full Text** or **PDF Full text** on the left side of the page to open the file.

**Abstract:** The relationship between activation of positive stereotypes and academic performance is not clear. Some studies have found that the activating of positive stereotypes boosts performance, whereas other studies have found that it hurts performance.

**Tools:** Print, E-mail, Save, Cite, Export, Permalink, Share, Listen, Translate

On the right side of the page there are several tools you can use, such as printing, emailing and saving the article. Click on **Cite** to see how to cite the article according to different referencing systems. Click on **Export** to export the citation of the article to reference management software such as EndNote. Click on **Add to Folder** to add to your personal folder of articles on EBSCO.

## PDFs

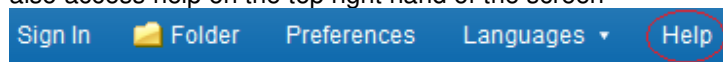
Once you have opened the PDF you should see a toolbar at the top of the page.
